Spotlight - Susan Browning

1. Tell us about your first horse? Breed? Age? Your Age? (Child, Preteen, Teen, Young Adult, Mature,)

My first horse was "Rusty." He was 1/2 Morgan and 1/2 quarter horse. I was the fourth of five girls. By the time I was born Rusty had already raised my three older sisters and numerous neighbor kids. My mother says I started riding before I could walk. Rusty had to be put down when I was fourteen. He was in his 30's. He gave us all he could for as long as he could. I still miss him. 





From Jan – "Copper Basin is kind of between the White Clouds & the Frank Church Wilderness areas.....very rough getting in w/mtr.home/trailers, but oh sooooo worth it"!

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Many of you shared this on Facebook but it is worth reading again

Dear Drivers,

My most valued possession is inside the trailer behind my truck. He stepped into that rolling steel box because I asked him to and he trusts me. He's a living, breathing creature, and all 1200lbs of him are precariously balanced on four tiny hooves as my truck and trailer wind down the road. Sometimes I have 3 animals back there, tripling my weight and stopping distance. Other times I have a debilitated animal, barely alive after being rescued from a life of neglect. I may drive slower to compensate so that they don't go crashing to the floor.

My horses are not a load of lumber, a boat or camp trailer, and I cannot stop quickly or turn sharply without risking their safety and their lives.

Know that I will do just about anything to avoid hitting the brakes with a horse in my trailer. However, if your Honda is hidden in the blind spot behind my horse trailer and I do have to stop suddenly, you're too close to stop without ending up in the trailer with my horses.

When I make those wide turns, I need them to prevent my horses from scrambling. Please give me room and time to turn.

And that large distance between me and the car in front of me? It might look like enough room to fit three sedans bumper to bumper, but it's actually the distance I need to stop

softly and safely without my horses falling.

Those times when we're headed up a hill, my speed is as fast as I can (or want to) go. Your Honda can't push us up this hill. I promise I'll move to the right lane when it becomes available or pull over if I find a safe spot on the shoulder, but until then I ask for your patience and some space. Furthermore, I'm usually already doing the speed limit. Don't pull out in front of me because you automatically assume a truck and trailer is going slower than regular traffic.

Lastly, my set up weighs 3 tons, empty, and that much weight prevents me from swerving safely. Horses are an additional live weight that shifts and moves with each little movement of the truck and trailer. When you pass me going 80mph uphill on a blind corner, you don't just put my horses at risk: Your driving threatens the lives of the oncoming driver, my passenger, me, you, and everyone in the cars behind us.

So next time you see a horse trailer, assume an animal's in there. Please give the them some space and offer some patience. By driving safely, we'll all get where we're going.
